Superintendent of Schools

To the Honorable School Committee, Board of Selectmen, and Citizens of North Kennebunkport:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration my fourth annual report of schools. Every year since the great world war, educators everywhere have realized as never before the growing vital concern of education to public welfare. Indeed, the needs for education are plainly demanded for reasons much more complex than any generation preceding ours has ever suspected. The individual must be measurably equipped to participate in the civilization which makes up the social, economic, and political life into which he must enter, not as spectator, but as participant.

The best sentiment in North Kennebunkport desires I believe above every consideration, the preparation of its childhood in things educational. They wish that education to be so thorough that on reaching maturity the child may participate with an enlightened mind and a progressive interest in constructive citizenship. This is a wholesome sign and worthy of our best effort.

The teachers have had a happy, and, I think, successful year. They have attended the teachers' meetings each month when it has been possible and have made progress in their professional interests and practice. I

have had the most cordial and whole hearted co-operation from the teachers of North Kennebunkport. I wish to commend the effort which your teachers have made this year to standardize the schools in the fundamental subjects. Much time and study has been given to understanding the needs of individual children and to rendering service. The Burnham School has 37 pupils at present and with the present system of grading is a large school. The other schools have this year maintained a very good average attendance.

TRANSPORTATION

Transportation has, since the completion of the new cement road, brought to the Town new residents and new problems of transportation. It is desirable that the whole problem of transportation be discussed at the Town Meeting. The School Committee would like direction as to the will of the citizens of the Town in this matter. If transportation is continued it will be necessary to transport the children in comfort. There are fifteen who are eligible to transportation in North Kennebunkport to the Burnham school at present. This is a large number. On the other hand the opening of the Iron Bridge school would leave certain children on the new cement road with a considerable, though not a prohibitive, distance to walk, I recommend that steps be taken to ascertain what policy the citizens wish the School Committee to follow out.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE

I wish in this report to make mention of several things of importance in connection with the School Committee. Let me say at the outset that you have a right to be proud of your School Committee. Their service has been unselfish and conspicuously helpful. They have given of

their time and ability in trying to maintain your schools on an equality with the schools of adjacent towns. They have co-operated with the teachers and pupils in every way within their powers. Many towns are finding it difficult to get whole hearted and unselfish service. There is often criticism made of the School Committee which is of an unjust nature and most unwarranted. You are fortunate in having such conspicuous service which has a sympathy and breadth of vision that so supplements the teachers' needs. They do not receive any compensation but their work is both important and valuable if education is to be thoroughgoing. The usual financial statement and statistics will accompany this report.

WARRANT

For Town Meeting, March 4, 1929

STATE OF MAINE

County of York, ss.

To Florence R. Hayes, Constable of the Town of North
Kennebunkport, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby re-
quired to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said
Town of North Kennebunkport, qualified by law to vote
in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said
Town, on the fourth day of March, 1929, at ten o'clock
in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article One—To choose a Moderator to preside at said
meeting.

Article Two—To see if the Town will vote to dispense
with the use of the check list at this meeting.

Article Three—To choose all necessary Town Officers
for the ensuing year.

Article Four—To see how much the Town will vote to
raise for the support of Common Schools.

Article Five—To see what sum the Town will vote to
raise for Repairs and Insurance c-i School Buildings.

Article Six—To see what sum the Town will vote to
raise for Free Text Books.

Article Seven—To see what sum the Town will vote to
raise for School Supplies.

Article Eight—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Hundred Seventy-five Dollars for salary of Superintendent of Schools.

Article Nine—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise for the Repair of Roads and Bridges, and see what sum of money shall be paid to the Road Commissioners per day for their services, and fix the price per hour for labor on highways.

Article Ten—To see if the Town will vote, grant and raise a sum of money to cut and destroy all bushes on State Highway, State Aid and Third Class Roads, to comply with Chapter 145, P. L. 1927, and if so, how much.

Article Eleven—To see if the Town will vote, grant and raise a sum of money to repair and maintain Third Class Road to comply with Chapter 124, P. L. 1927, and if so, how much.

Article Twelve—To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid, as provided in Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157, Section 6, of the Public Laws of 1919, and as further amended by Chapter 139, Section 7, of the Public Laws of 1927.

Article Thirteen—To see what sum the Town will vote to raise, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 157, Section 6, of the Public Laws of 1919, and as further amended by Chapter 139, Section 7, of the Public Laws of 1927, for the construction of a State Aid Highway No. 1, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, extending from the New Straight

Road, so called, being State Highway No. 1, and continuing in a northerly and easterly direction to the State Highway No. 11, to be a continuation of that part of the State Aid Highway already built.

Article Fourteen—On petition of Henry Sinnott and others, to see if the Town will vote to grant and raise the sum of Five Hundred Dollars for repairs on the Smith Road, so called, said road beginning near residence of Harvey Cluff and extending in a southeasterly direction to the Kennebunkport town line near Kennebunkport Town House.

Article Fifteen—To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for the Removal of Snow.

Article Sixteen—To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for the Support of the Poor.

Article Seventeen—To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for the Contingent Fund.

Article Eighteen—To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Article Nineteen—To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to be used in payment for services of out-of-town Fire Companies.

Article Twenty—To see if the Town will raise money to provide for the services of a Public Health Nurse, or take action thereon. This action is made legal by the Maine Legislature of 1925; see Section 58, Chapter 140 of the 1925 Statutes.

Article Twenty-one—To see if the Town will vote to

accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

Article Twenty-two—To see if the Town will vote that for the purpose of procuring a Temporary Loan to and for the use of the Town of North Kennebunkport, to pay the indebtedness of said Town, due to become due during the present municipal year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, the Town Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$10,000.000, and to execute and deliver the note or; notes of the Town therefor, signed by the Town Treasurer and countersigned by the Municipal Officers, of the Town.

Article Twenty-three—To see if the Town will vote to raise Twelve Hundred Dollars to pay note and interest coming due on tractor and snow plow.

Article Twenty-four—To act on any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters.
